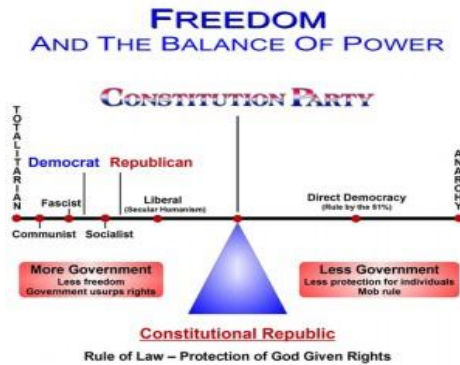

Constitution Party FAQ

Q: Is the Party Liberal or Conservative?

A: Neither. It is Constitutionalist, which means that we support limited government as outlined in the Constitution.

Q: Why are some State Party names different?

A: Most State Parties changed their name to "Constitution Party" after a coalition of states that formed the U.S. Taxpayer Party became the Constitution Party in 1999. A handful of states were unable to change their state-registered names because of individual state restrictions. The U.S. Taxpayer Party of Michigan and the American Independent Party of Nevada are just two examples.

Q: How long has the Constitution Party been around?

A: In 1992, a number of independent state parties united to form the U.S. Taxpayers Party. In 1999, at its national nominating convention for the 2000 elections, convention delegates chose to change the party name to the "Constitution Party", to better reflect the party's core beliefs stated in the U.S. Constitution.

Q: Is the Constitution Party of PA a Major or Minor Political Party?

A: Under PA election law, at present we are neither a major or minor political party. We come under the statutory definition of a "Political Body". To become a minor political party, we must garner at least 2% of the top vote getter in a statewide election and that only lasts for two years.

The Constitution Party National Platform

We declare the platform of the Constitution Party to be predicated on the principles of The Declaration of Independence, The Constitution of the United States and The Bill of Rights According to the original intent of the Founding Fathers. These founding documents are the foundation of our Liberty and the Supreme Law of the Land.
